
Background information

Printing Printing is using objects or shapes to transfer paint and create patterns.	 First, etch your design onto a Quicprint foam board. Then, roll out ink onto a tray. After this, place the inked foam over the paper, using a clean dry roller, apply even pressure. Finally, take off the paper to reveal your print.
