Key Texts:

Fire Poetry

Non- Fiction Texts

Vlad and The Great Fire of London.

Writing: Shape poetry, diary entry, non-chronological reports.

Reading: Recognise some different forms of poetry and patterns within the poetry. Read non-fiction texts and look at index, glossary and dictionaries.

Spoken Word: Practise reading poems out loud. Perform their poems to the class. Add expression and emphasis to their reading.

Text and Word: Children will identify and use expanded noun phrases, co-ordination and subordination and different sentence types. The children will learn to write in the simple past and past progressive tense.

Punctuation: To write in sentences using capital letters at the beginning and full stops at the end.

Sentence structure: The children will explore the use of structural features including headings, sub-headings and paragraphs to give structure and clarity to their writing.

Learning Theme

What can we learn from The Great Fire of London?

In **History**, children will learn about the Great Fire of London. They will be learning about what it was like to live in 1666 and what London was like before and after the fire. We will also be re-enacting the 'Great Fire of London' on our playground! In **Art**, children will explore tone and proportion to help them create collages and silhouette cityscapes of London. In **Music**, children learn to sing the song 'Once a Man Fell in a Well' and to play it using tuned percussion. Using letter notation to write a melody.
