Writing:

- Non-chronological report
- Windrush

Reading:

- Children will increase their familiarity with a wide range of books, including non-fiction texts
- Children will also show an understanding of their reading through intonation, tone and volume to ensure that the meaning is clear to their audience.
- Children will draw inferences such as inferring characters' feelings, thoughts and motives from their actions, and justifying inferences with evidence

Spoken Word:

- ask relevant questions to extend their understanding and knowledge
- learn to give well-structured descriptions, explanations and narratives for different purposes, including for expressing feelings

Text and Word:

Children will learn to use the active and passive voice appropriately.

Punctuation:

Use semi-colons and colons to separate clauses. Use semi-colons to separate items in a list and dashes to add information.

Sentence structure:

Relative clauses beginning with who, which, where, why or whose. Use complex sentences. Using passive and active verbs.

Learning Theme

In **history**, we will be looking at the impact of the British Empire in the 20th century and its lasting legacies. Some of the topics the children will study include the NHS, technology, music and fashion.

In **art**, we will be discussing the artwork of Banksy and reflecting on how art is produced for different purposes (message, enjoyment, commission). The children will learn how to create a screen print and explore they can use design and colour to create an impact. In **music**, the children will be learning about theme and variation.
