- **Community**




Alongside the **substantive knowledge** within these themes sits the disciplinary knowledge/knowledge and skills/skills of subject:

- Empathy

As philosophers we:

- use wisdom from different sources to enable us to understand beliefs, concepts and practises
- explore artefacts and understand key symbols and rituals linked to the worldviews we are learning about
- reflect and respect different worldviews
- ask big questions
- use knowledge organisers to understand new vocabulary and develop ideas
- demonstrate an appreciation of the nature of worldviews and the important contribution of religion and belief, spiritual insights and values to the individual's search for meaning in life;
- recognise that someone's worldview, including their own, can be influenced by many factors and is an intrinsic part of how they view the world;
- develop knowledge and understanding of Christianity, and of the other principal religions and beliefs represented in Great Britain, through their history, contemporary diverse expressions and encountering peoples' lived experience;
- develop interest in and enthusiasm for the study of worldviews and enhance their own spiritual, moral, social and cultural development;
- develop the ability to make reasoned, informed and creative responses to religious and moral issues;
- recognise the influence of beliefs, values and traditions on the individual, on culture and on communities throughout the world.



Experiences every child should have:

- Attend at least two church services each year
- Annual visits to the church to support year group specific learning
- Learn about Christianity, Hinduism, Sikhism, Islam, Judaism, Buddhism and Humanism
- Experience other faiths through visits and visitors
- Learn about key festivals throughout the year through collective worship and the curriculum e.g St George's Day, Eid and Chinese New Year
- Easter and Christmas Pause Days and interfaith week
- Interact with the class reflection area at least half-termly
